Here is an extract from my speech that night for your information.

"2010 has been another good year for our school. Another year in which we have consolidated the good things that have been happening for several years now, embedding them into the culture of our school for many years to come. In Dance, I saw our Bollywood Group win the judges award at the Auckland competition for the second year running from 23 schools. We also had a fantastic dance concert showcasing a wide range of styles late last term.

In Drama, it has been a major production year and 'Beauty and the Beast' was all quality once again from Ms Whillans and her team and cast. Our International Week featured a wide variety of performances from traditional to modern and Kapahaka once again dominated the first six weeks of the year. Tonight is the academic highlight of our year and this has been made all the more memorable by having His Worship, our Mayor, join us. Mr Benton's speech continues...

2010 has unfortunately also seen industrial action from teachers in support of their Collective Employment Contract negotiations. In difficult economic times, teachers probably did not expect much but negotiations began badly when the initial offer from the Ministry of Education sought to remove existing conditions of service. A claytons offer which has led to entrenched positions. A lot of the talking has been through the media and a lot has involved teacher bashing and half truths. In defence of teachers and teaching as a profession, it is worth noting that we rank 4<sup>th</sup> in the OECD list of developed countries for our students' literacy and numeracy levels off a per capita spend that ranks towards the bottom of the list. We give fantastic value for the taxpayer's dollar. An international report published just days ago rated our education system 1<sup>st</sup>. Yes, we do have a long tail of underachievement, so while we average 4<sup>th</sup>, we also have too many who fall well behind. This is the teachers' fault says the Minister. Not so say I when the overwhelming majority of these students who arrive in our schools already way behind their peers are the product of the dysfunctional underbelly of New Zealand. These children come from homes characterised by violence, abuse of drugs, alcohol and children, poor health care, poor nutrition and overcrowding. Most of these children are known to CYFS and have spent time in their care. For many of these children, the damage is already profound and it is too late to make a difference by the time they reach primary school, almost impossible when they are aged 13. Our primary colleagues are very concerned about the escalating incidence of verbally and physically violent children in our schools. Schools do make huge gains with some of these youngsters but it is impossible when the child returns each night to a violent and abusive home. We have these homes in Glenfield and right across Auckland. Your Worship, you are the closest person to the Beehive that we have here tonight and I know that you care deeply about our most disadvantaged, especially the children. My plea is that Government tackle the problem of our growing underbelly effectively. Children can't spend their first five years in such homes and be expected to cope with school. We need to work together to create an Auckland where people matter and kids matter most. Then our tail of underachievement will begin to shrink."

**Since the Prize Giving,** Ryan De Vries was named Auckland Soccer Player of the Year at the annual ASB Young Sportsperson of the Year Awards and was also named in the top five sportsmen for secondary schools in 2010.

Contract negotiations for teachers have broken down again and the industrial action continues for Year 10 on Tuesday November 23<sup>rd</sup> and Year 9 on Wednesday December 1<sup>st</sup>.
