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Principal's Report

2010 has been another good year for our school. Another year in which we have consolidated the good things that have been happening for several years now, embedding them into the culture of our school for many years to come. I think of the huge numbers of students who have come up on stage every Friday at assemblies this year for gaining excellence in their work - far more than last year and so too the numbers receiving industry awards this year. I love the way our students support each other and acknowledge each others' achievements right across all the diversity that we have in our school - the best example being the wonderful support that they gave to every group that performed in International Week. They couldn't believe that this was the same school. Their report confirms that we are doing really well. Congratulations to you all for playing your part.

The highlight of this year once again has been the joy of seeing groups and individuals doing well, punching above their weight and getting noticed at the highest level. In sports, Pita Rona made the Black Sox softball squad, along with his dad Brad, and Ryan De Vries made the NZ U20 Soccer Team. Kate Southee made the NH U18A Hockey Team and NH U15 Girls Cricket Team as well as inspiring our 1st X1 Girls Hockey to win the NH 1st grade competition. Casey Hewitt made the NH Rugby U18 Development Team and Herman Ene made the U16 NH Rugby Team and both helped the 1st XV to win the 1B competition and gain promotion to the top 6 round for 2011. Remember, there are about 15 secondary schools in NH and we are one of the smaller ones. In Music we once again won a Silver Award at the KBB Music Competition and in Dance, I saw our Bollywood group win the Judges' Award at the Auckland competition for the second year running, from 23 schools. We also had a fantastic dance concert showcasing a wide range of styles late last term. In Drama, it has been a major production year and 'Beauty and the Beast' was all quality once again from Ms Whillans and her team and cast. Our International Week featured a wide variety of performances from traditional to modern and Kapahaka once again dominated the first 6 weeks of the year. The biggest occasion of every year is the Senior Academic Prizegiving - made all the more memorable this year by having His Worship, the Mayor of greater Auckland, join us. Mayor Brown mixed easily with everyone and inspired with his vision for the youth of Auckland. This was a fitting finale to a great year for Glenfield.

B.O.T. Chairman's Report

Part of my role as Board Chair is to give a brief commentary from the Board on the College year. So what's being happening in 2010?

After a couple of years of significant building development, 2010 has been much quieter on that front as we move towards the end of our current 5 year plan.

Although, if you have been around the back of the college recently you will have

seen that the four tennis courts are now covered in astro turf creating a much improved facility not only for tennis, but also for netball and hockey. Visually I think it improves that area of the school quite dramatically as well – having effectively got rid of a large area of unattractive concrete.

From a Board perspective, the most significant event of the year was the visit of the Education Review Office (ERO for short). ERO goes to every school every 3 years or so to assess and comment on how the school is performing as per its obligations. NCEA exams are looming for students – well, the ERO visit was our external assessment. The ERO report is also critical because it sends a strong signal, one way or the other, to the wider community as to the health of the school and provides a formal record in the public domain that stays in place until the next ERO visit. And 3 years is a long time to have the report sitting there if it is in any way negative. Inevitably it becomes a factor when prospective students and their parents are considering secondary schools.

Just as students don't want to just pass in their exams, but rather aim to pass at the highest level of achievement they possibly can, the same goes for us with our ERO report, and I'm delighted and proud to say that the report was extremely positive, offering no real negatives for Glenfield College at all and a huge number of positives – it certainly confirmed and ratified everything that we as a Board hoped it would based on the continual process of improvement that we've seen happening at Glenfield College in the 4 years or so that most of us on the Board have been involved. A huge compliment must of course go to everyone involved with the running of the college - Mr Benton, his senior management team, all the teaching and the non teaching staff.

For parents and caregivers - if you haven't read the report I would strongly suggest that you do.

Having enough funds in a school to do even a modest percentage of everything you would like to do is a big challenge, in reality an impossibility. Outside of the government funding, Glenfield College has historically had two other main sources of income that I want to touch on:

Community Education (Comm Ed for short) has been part of Glenfield College for the 40 years of its existence, and I would like to think will continue to be a part of the character of the college for another 40 years. The extra income the college has been able to generate from it has contributed each year, for example, to the high amount of modern computer equipment in the College.

The change in government funding for Comm Ed announced late last year hit the college budget hard, reducing income by about \$250,000 – income that simply can't be replaced. As a Board we want to continue with our Comm Ed programme; it's part of what Glenfield College is and part of our commitment to the community, but it has gone from being a reliable contributor to college finances, to being a service that we now have to focus on just to ensure we can at least break even on it.

On the other side of the coin, the College's overseas students programme continues to be successful and steadily build. This year we have had over 90 students from overseas attend the College, some for only 6 weeks or so, others for the full year. As well as providing a quality experience for the overseas students who come to the college and adding to the breadth of college life in return, it also adds significantly to college income.

To the Year 13s in particular, but also any other students, teachers and family who are leaving Glenfield College this year, thank you - thank you for your contribution to the life of the College. I know that each of you will leave a bit of yourself behind that will add to the fabric, to the strength, of Glenfield College. Hopefully each of you will also take that affinity with Glenfield College with you when you leave, and, most of all, carry it proudly.

Royal New Zealand Ballet

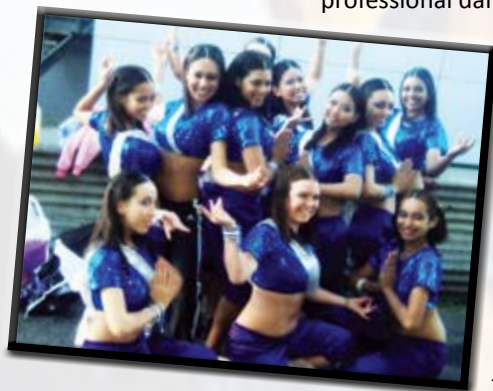

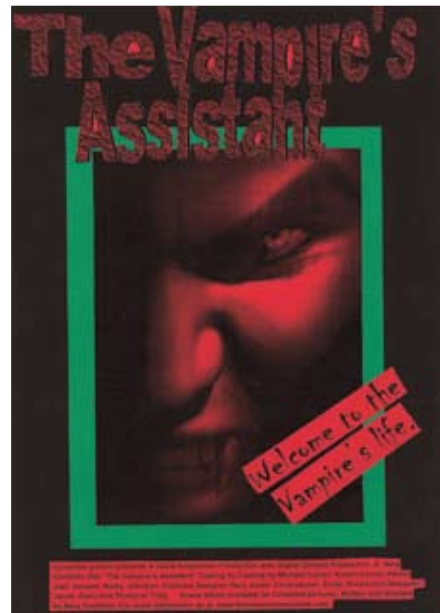
The next day in class, my mind slowly drifted off once again till I was sleeping soundlessly.

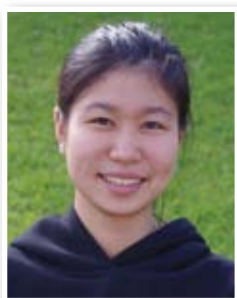

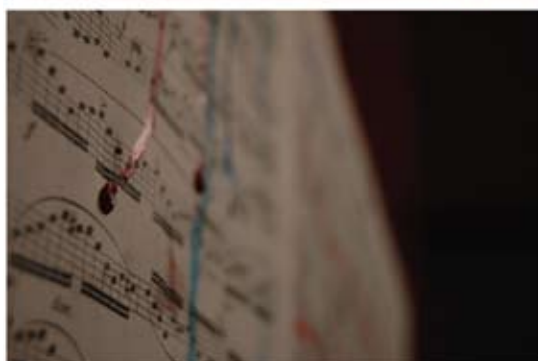

We managed to get 500 plants for a riparian planting on the bottom field. Finally the Year 10 Maori class and a few other helpers from the cadet group planted over 40 harakeke (flax) plants to be used in the future for the manufacture of kete for the Maori whanau groups. 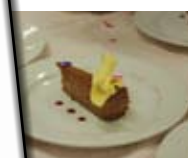
Year 13 Restaurant

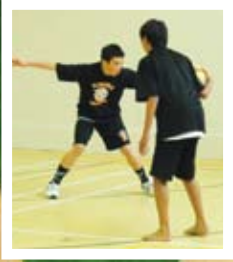


HSI Hospitality Challenge

Induction Week

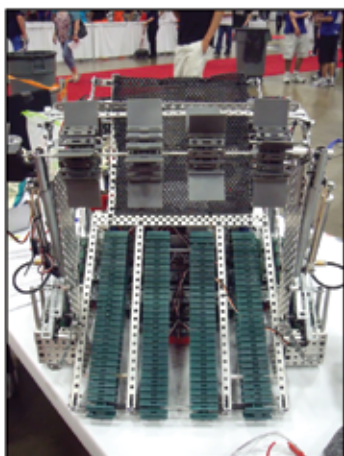

BUILD-ABILITY CHALLENGE PROJECT

Apple Tree Kindergarten now has a workbench that has been purpose-built by three students at Glenfield College. The Year 13 students decided to dedicate the project they made for the 2010 Build Ability Challenge to the Community this year and chose the Apple Tree Kindergarten. The challenge is sponsored by the Building Construction Industry Training Organisation (BCITO) which supervises apprenticeships in the building industry as well as NCEA unit standards for secondary school students studying construction technology.

The project consisted of a workbench to cater for up to four kindergarten children working on the table at once, with plenty of room for storage and able to be moved easily when needed.

Apple Tree Preschool Centre was established in 2005 in Glenfield, Auckland, for children from two to five years of age, and is always striving to provide new and engaging activities for the kids. One area that they felt needed some development was the use of small hand tools and a suitable area for project work. The workbench was made from solid macrocarpa wood and has a laminated top and includes shelving and drawers underneath for the storage of tools and projects.

On Monday, 23 August, the project was presented to the kids and the owner of the Apple Tree Kindergarten, Ban, who were all extremely impressed with the finished bench and the quality of workmanship that had been placed into it. The kids were surprised and curious about the new bench and wanted to use it straight away. Two representatives from the Building Industry Training Organisation also attended the presentation.

Sport Coordinator's Report

The 2010 sports season will go down as one of the most successful in the recent history of Glenfield College and it is not hard to see why. Our participation rates are holding steady, the number of sports offered or participated in has increased and we now have more 1st teams competing in the highest grades of their respective competitions than ever before. A number of teams were able to attend Winter Tournament Week and we once again completed another successful tour to Canada for boys' football. To top that off we have also seen a number of outstanding individual performances from both current and ex pupils. From a Sports Department point of view this is very encouraging to see and we look forward to seeing our teams and individuals progress further up the ladder of success.

With an increase in the number of sports offered we now have just over 42% of our students competing in 17 different sports in 52 different teams. This is up 3 sports from last year.

New sports competed in this year include a return to the pool for the North Harbour Zone Swimming Champs where 4 of our students competed against the best that North Harbour had to offer as well as a stand out performance in boys' Moto X by Dylan Primrose, winning his section of the Schools' Champs.

Winter Tournament Week once again saw a number of teams fundraising in readiness to travel out of North Harbour and compete against schools from all around the country. The 1st XI Girls Hockey team managed to secure a tournament close to home and narrowly missed out on making the final in Auckland for the 2nd year in a row, losing out in the semifinals but still managing to end the week with a win and finished 3rd overall. 1st XI Boys Hockey ventured north to Whangarei where a couple of losses in pool play saw them competing for 11th – 12th on finals day. In a dramatic improvement on previous tournament results, the Boys Hockey also managed to secure a win on finals day to finish just outside the top 10 in 11th place.

Senior Boys Basketball and Senior Boys Badminton also competed well at their respective tournaments with our Badminton team finishing 6th in their grade.

A number of our teams have also placed highly this year with teams from Basketball, Hockey and Rugby winning their grades. The 1st XV rugby team managed to go one better than last year in winning the 1b section of the North Harbour Competition. The road to the final was a hard-fought affair and the hard work put in at the beginning of the season certainly produced the result that this team was looking for. In Basketball the U17 Boys A and B teams managed to make it an all Glenfield affair when they met each other in the final of the U17B league. While a Glenfield victory in this grade was a guarantee it was the U17A team that managed to pull off the win against the B team. Last but not means least the 1st XI Girls Hockey team pulled off an amazing season to win the 1st round of their B grade and be promoted to 1A for the 2nd round where they picked off teams one by one to win the North Harbour based competition. In doing so they placed 6th overall out of all the North Harbour teams. Add to this the success at winter tournament week and a Team of the Year Award was almost guaranteed at the annual Glenfield College Sports awards.

As well as the success of all our teams a number of individuals have achieved at the highest level: Rian Setiawan was 3rd in the junior Discus at the North Harbour Athletics Champs. Kate Southee was selected to represent North Harbour in Both Cricket and Hockey. Loata Vuetilovoni, Sophie Hills, Jason Widjaja, and Joseph Nunag were all selected to represent North Harbour at Basketball. Herman Ene was also a dual representative being selected into the North Harbour Rugby Union and Rugby League age group teams respectively and Casey Hewitt was a selection into the North Harbour U18 Development team for Rugby Union.

Two students have also been selected into National teams with Ryan De Vries continuing his football prowess and gaining selection into the Junior All Whites. Ryan was also named as finalist in Football for the ASB College Sport Young Sports Person of the Year Awards. Pita Rona is also following closely in his father's Softball cleats in gaining selection to the Junior Black Sox and gaining a nod from national selectors to attend the training camp for the Senior Black Sox. An international exchange was again a feature on our calendar and this year we sent a Boys Football Team to our host city of Burlington, Ontario, Canada. This is the 2nd time an exchange of this type has been offered and after just over a year of planning and fundraising 14 boys left Auckland to play 3 exhibition matches against host schools from the local area. (See the "Canada Tour" report for the full story) All 3 games were played in great spirit with the boys coming home undefeated.

This season wouldn't be complete without saying thank you to the people behind the teams that make it all possible for you to participate and play.

If you see your Coach, Manager, Mum, Dad, Administrator, Referee or Umpire that helped make this season so successful, go up to them and say, "Thank You". Without them none of what you have just read would have been possible.

Boys' Football Canada Tour

This year 14 boys, along with Mr Tod and Mr Brook, travelled to Burlington, Ontario, Canada to take part in a sports exchange that would best be described as the opportunity of a lifetime.

This is the 2nd time a Glenfield College Sports team has travelled to Canada and after a year of planning and fundraising, the group of 16 strong met at Auckland International airport eager to leave the land of the long white (wet) cloud and touch down in the land of Moose, Maple Syrup and Ice Hockey. After 18 hours of sitting, sleeping and watching films, the boys were exhausted yet excited to finally indulge in Canada's delights.

Aldershot High School, who have visited our fair shores before, was our host school and the group were billeted for the first week with a group of students keen to share in the way of the Canadian. This allowed them to spend a day in school with their billets and experience all the things that a Canadian school has to offer; like no uniforms, massive lockers, cafeteria food that doesn't require a heart tick and a massive amount of 'school spirit'. Our main goal of the tour was of course to take part in three exhibition football matches and pit our skills against what the Canadian schools had to offer.

before the game and allowing most of their students out of class to come and support. Fortunately for us, the home and crowd advantage that Mentor College possessed did not extend as far as the playing field and we secured our first win of the tour - Glenfield 3 – Mentor 1.

The 2nd game of the tour was against Lester B. Pearson High School (Pearson Patriots). 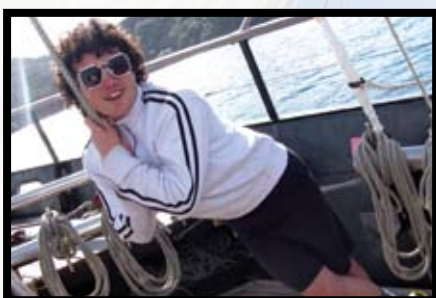
