Keeping Teenagers Safe

There has been a lot of media coverage recently about teenage abuse of alcohol and drugs and the impact that this has on individuals, family and friends. I don't believe that there is any one solution to this issue but there are a number of things worth considering as parents.

Firstly, you are the parents, the adults in the home and it is your role to take the lead and to lead responsibly. You set the rules and code of behaviour for your children and provided you are fair and reasonable, they should comply. It pays to work really hard to keep the communication channels open and honest. Try to give reasons for your decisions.

I don't think that young people should have access to alcohol unless they are old enough to buy it themselves (18 years old). Put simply, don't buy it for them! It's a luxury product, not a necessity. If an 18 or 19 year old child who earns an income and lives at home wants to drink at home with friends whenever he or she likes, my answer would be no! It's your house and your rules. If he or she is reasonable and asks to do this occasionally with friends, it may be a yes. Respect goes both ways. If they behave well, clean up and treat you with respect then this can be a positive. However, younger teenagers have no need to be involved with alcohol at all and certainly not to have it facilitated or purchased by parents.

As parents, you should know your teenagers' whereabouts at all times. You have every right to know where they are going and who will be there. If they are going to a friend's, know the friend and the parents. Call the parents to check that they will be at home while your child is there. Ensure that the transport arrangements are safe or better still, do the drop-off and pick up yourself. Your child may complain about a lack of freedom but at least they know you care.

As parents, you need to be good role models. It is very difficult to have any credibility with teenagers when they see you making the same mistakes that you are asking them to avoid. So all those things like consuming alcohol only in moderation, never taking drugs and being a responsible driver go without saying really. There is little chance for those teenagers who see this from the adults around them daily. While most of you do a great job as parents, we are too often surprised by the unbelievable freedoms, poor role modelling and lack of guidance afforded some students.

Remember that teenagers are children in adults' bodies. They are just pretending to be adults and need their training wheels, your common sense boundaries and support. It's where there are no boundaries or support that the trouble starts. It's great fun walking with teenagers through these formative years which is why we do this job.

Punctuality and Uniform

Thank you to all of you who have made a real effort to get your youngster into enough correct uniform to survive the winter. We will keep the vigilance up. Don't forget that all students taking PE must have a PE uniform and bring it to school for their PE class.

Punctuality is also on the radar at present as we chase any lateness. It is vital that our students learn to be punctual not only for their learning now but also in order to keep any future employment. It is a vital attribute to have in order to advance in the modern world. Students who are late to school must make up the time at interval on the day that they are


